Put your mentoring hat on. Your Master Gardeners organization is looking for enthusiastic members who will lend a hand to the next crop of Interns. With your help, they can become Master Gardeners, too. Your help is important. There is a huge rate of attrition between finishing the class and certifying as a Master Gardener. Please volunteer to become a mentor as of March 26, the last class meeting of the current training. You don't have to be present at that class. Your Intern will receive your contact information. We will email or text your Intern's information to you. You'll meet at graduation.

We need 14 volunteer mentors! If 14 Master Gardeners don't volunteer, Kelly and Kathie threaten to have George name the rest. Oh, please don't let that happen.

We'll do our best to assign mentors to Interns who live relatively close to them. That's not always possible, but we'll try. That way, it will be convenient to offer to stop by their gardens to see what you might be helpful with. Or offer to pick up your Intern for events. The "job" is really easy, especially for outgoing, friendly people. As a reminder, we'll share the club's mentoring guidelines:

- * Learn the name of the Intern and other Interns as soon as possible. Encourage the wearing of name badges.
- * Wear your name badge to all Master Gardeners' events.
- * Encourage Interns to attend meetings by calling, texting or emailing them ahead of time, and then sit with them.
- * Greet Interns by name and introduce them to Master Gardeners at meetings and other events.
- * Ask Interns if they have done volunteer service and, if needed, help them fill out the volunteer service record.
- * Be able to explain the difference between volunteer hours and CEUs.
- * Encourage Interns to participate in projects with you. When they come, make a special effort to welcome and include them in what you are doing.

Just think about the first time you walked into a Master Gardener meeting and didn't know anyone. How helpful a "buddy" would have been then! If someone helped you fit in, great. It's your turn to pay it forward. If nobody helped, you made it on your own and now you're an active member, you deserve extra credit. Perhaps, you have even more reason to help the next generation of Master Gardeners.

The Old Farmer Says...

This month...

- Be on the lookout for vole damage.
- It is a good time to add lungwort and Lenten rose to your shade garden.
- When night temps get above 40 feed your pansies.
- Rid landscape of winter weeds
- Broccoli, cabbage, brussel sprouts, lettuce, chard, onions and potatoes should be planted.
- Tie canes but do not trim climbing roses yet.
- It's an ideal time to cut back Knock Out roses, shrub roses, hydrangea, liriope, hardy fern, barrenwort, summer flowering spirea, beautyberry, nandina, overgrown hollies, ornamental grasses.
- Limb up trees and crapemyrtles.
- Check grafted plants and remove all growth below the graft'
- Drastically prune overgown hollies.
