## TEMG Intern Training Update - 2022

The UT Extension MG work-group is planning to continue a collaborative training in spring 2022. The focus will be to combine distance lectures, hands-on teaching, and building local relationships.

- Intern training online live on Tuesdays 9-11 am CT, UT Extension hopes you will consider hosting live, but individual viewing is also fine.
- Online sessions begin February 1st, continue until April 26th (13 online sessions)
- Each individual county is encouraged to host a visit on Tues, January 25th to teach the database, get to know each other, and provide an "orientation" to the county and program.
- Each county handles another 14 hours of inperson training on their own. (with January 25th counting towards the 14 other hours).
- The main additional element that we would like to add this year is more hands-on interactive elements. We will further develop this content through the fall.

## **GARDENING CALENDAR**

## **August**

# Prune summer flowering bushes. Collect seeds Continue picking warm season crops and correctly preserving produce for later use. Don't let weeds get ahead of you and produce seeds. Late plantings of summer squash can be done. Watch soil moisture levels, irrigate and side dress fruiting crops. Prepare soil for fall coolseason crops. Transplant fall coolseason crops that take the most days to mature.

## September



Harvest fruits and vegetables. Canning, freezing and drying are all good options for preservation. Put up herbs. Sow broad beans and hardy peas. Transplant broccoli and cauliflower by mid-September. Seed cover crops. Plant spring flowering bulbs. Keep track of how much and how often watering is needed., estimate 1-2 inches per week. Don't let late season weeds get ahead of you.
